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# MESSAGE FROM THE FOUNDER

FOUNDER

In 2016, Kansas City Women in Technology had a monumental year marked by increased community engagement, significant team growth and exciting new partnerships. In our mission to grow the number of women in technology careers, we found innovative ways to engage girls in tech, provided valuable content to women in the tech workforce and built organic mentor opportunities.

The year started out with four monthly programs: CoderDojoKC, Coding & Cupcakes, Coding & Cocktails and TechTalks. Additionally, we were able to form partnerships with Big Brothers Big Sisters and the Boys & Girls Club of Greater Kansas City. With reserved seats and laptops in our two youth coding workshops, we were able to help kids from underserved communities engage in coding education.

To help further our mission, we also created several new leadership roles. These additions consisted of two data analysts along with various supporting roles for

our coding programs, such as presentation director and mentor director. We strive to continue growing our mentors across all coding programs to create better pathways for growth and leadership for our members.

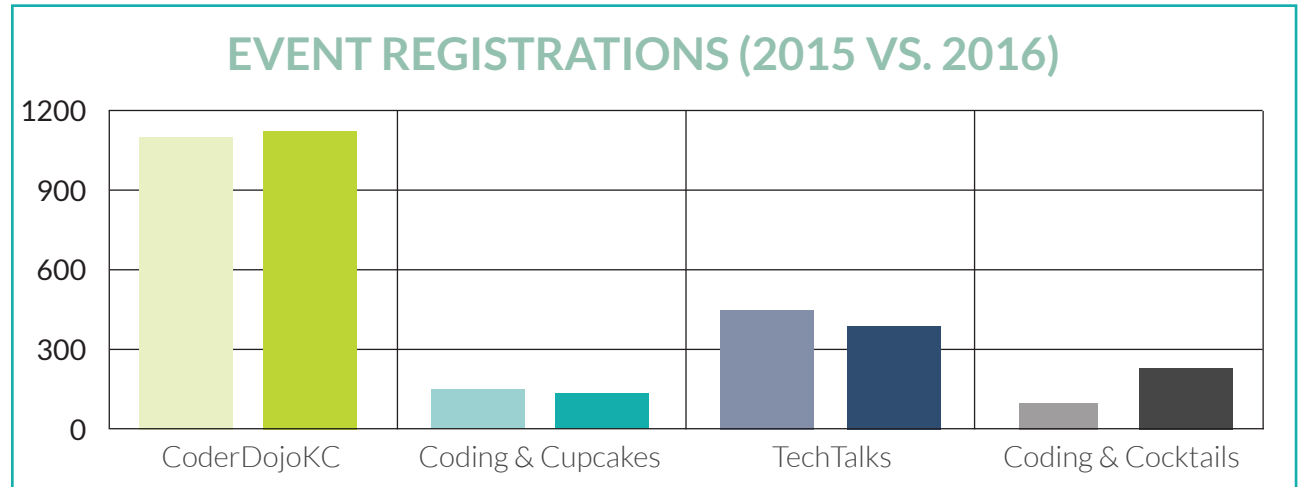
June of 2016 marked our first Django Girls event, where we hosted a weekend-long workshop that taught 78 women how to build websites from scratch. Many of the participants chose to continue coding education by applying to Launch Code and attending our Coding & Cocktails sessions.

By year end, Kansas City Women in Technology provided 45 technology events and served 2,453 people in the Kansas City community. Our leadership team also grew to 23 passionate volunteers running our day-to-day operations. Constantly inspired by the women we serve and those who come to us determined to fulfill their goals excelling in technical careers, we're excited to continue on this growth trajectory for 2017 as well.

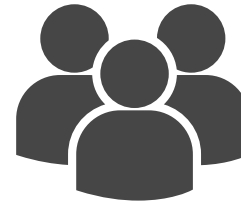
# 2016 AT A GLANCE

So she built Kansas City Women in Technology in 2013 to help women in tech careers network with each other and to create a way for other women to enter the industry. As the organization has flourished, more programs have grown – not only to reach out to women in tech currently, but to support girls' interest in technology from a young age and offer a supportive outlet for women who want to get involved on any level.

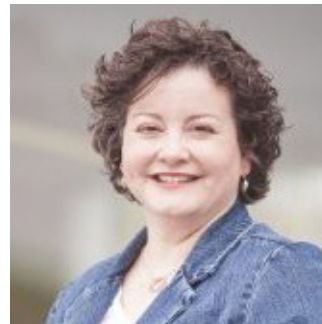

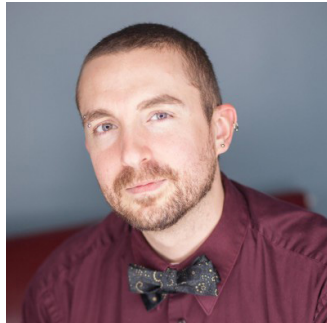

# CODING & COCKTAILS

Helping women who want to get into a coding career path, Coding & Cocktails provides the skills they need to be a front-end developer. Women who attend the program hear from a panel of female developers and mentors, get a topic-based presentation on a specific skill set and receive time to practice coding with access to mentors and experts who teach and guide.

## 2016 OVERVIEW:

- » 11 monthly sessions (*up from 4 sessions in 2015 – April, June, August and October*)
- » Built a curriculum that builds over each session, making for a year-long project
- » 166 attended (*up from 77 attendees in 2005*)
- » 23 female mentors
- » Leadership team expansion



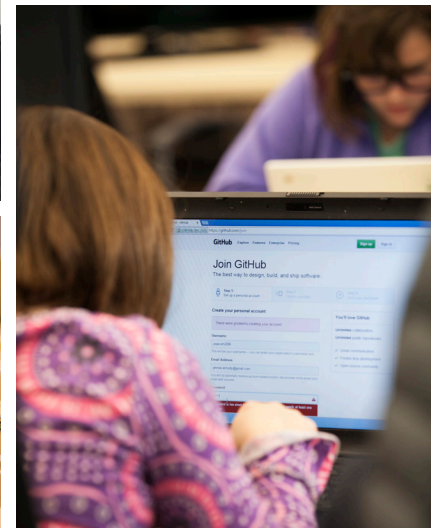


# CODING & CUPCAKES

Coding & Cupcakes was created to change any misconceptions parents may have about coding as a hobby or career for girls. It encourages parents to bring their daughters and explore programs like CoderDojoKC afterwards. The sessions are cupcake themed and attendees are able to learn from a panel of female developers and mentors while creating their own cupcake shop websites, learning about essential collaboration tools like Github and enjoying cupcakes as a tasty treat.

## 2016 OVERVIEW:

- » 11 monthly recurring sessions (*up from 4 sessions in 2015*)
- » Reduced sessions size for better quality
- » Ongoing curriculum enhancements
- » 88 girls attended
- » 13 female mentors



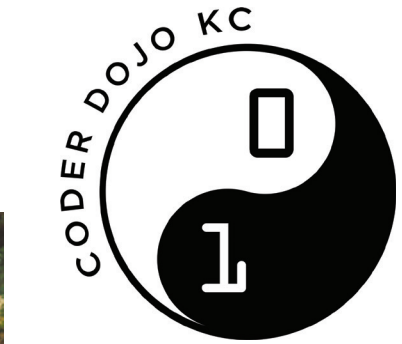
# CODERDOJOKC

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The Kansas City Chapter of CoderDojo occurs once a month. There are 100 spots available for K-12 youth and 25 laptops for families who can't afford their own. CoderDojoKC supports all skill levels. Kids who haven't coded are introduced to free online programs to get started, while kids with more experience are given project prompts and one-on-one time with mentors to work toward earning skill badges.

- » 58 kids per session (*63 kids in 2015*)
- » 36% girl attendees (*37% in 2015*)
- » 136 presentations

# TECHTALKS

This networking event includes an educational speaker or panel each month (Jan–Nov). The TechTalks are hosted at various locations throughout the city, often at technical companies, and allow attendees to find out more about Kansas City Women in Technology, along with the programs we offer.

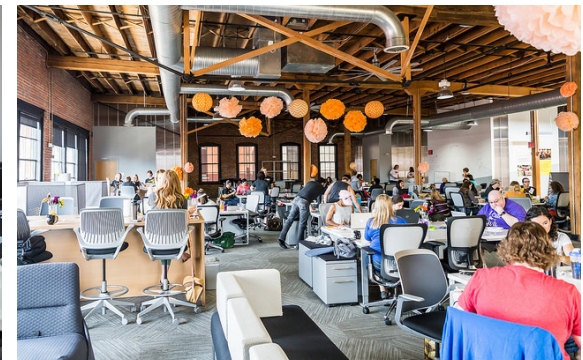


# DJANGO GIRLS

As a national nonprofit, Django Girls is known for creating curriculum and helping cities host workshops that teach women how to code with the Python framework, Django. Once a year, Kansas City Women in Technology hosts a weekend-long Django Girls workshop for 75-120 women learning to build websites. This year, 2016, was the first-ever time Kansas City has hosted Django Girls.

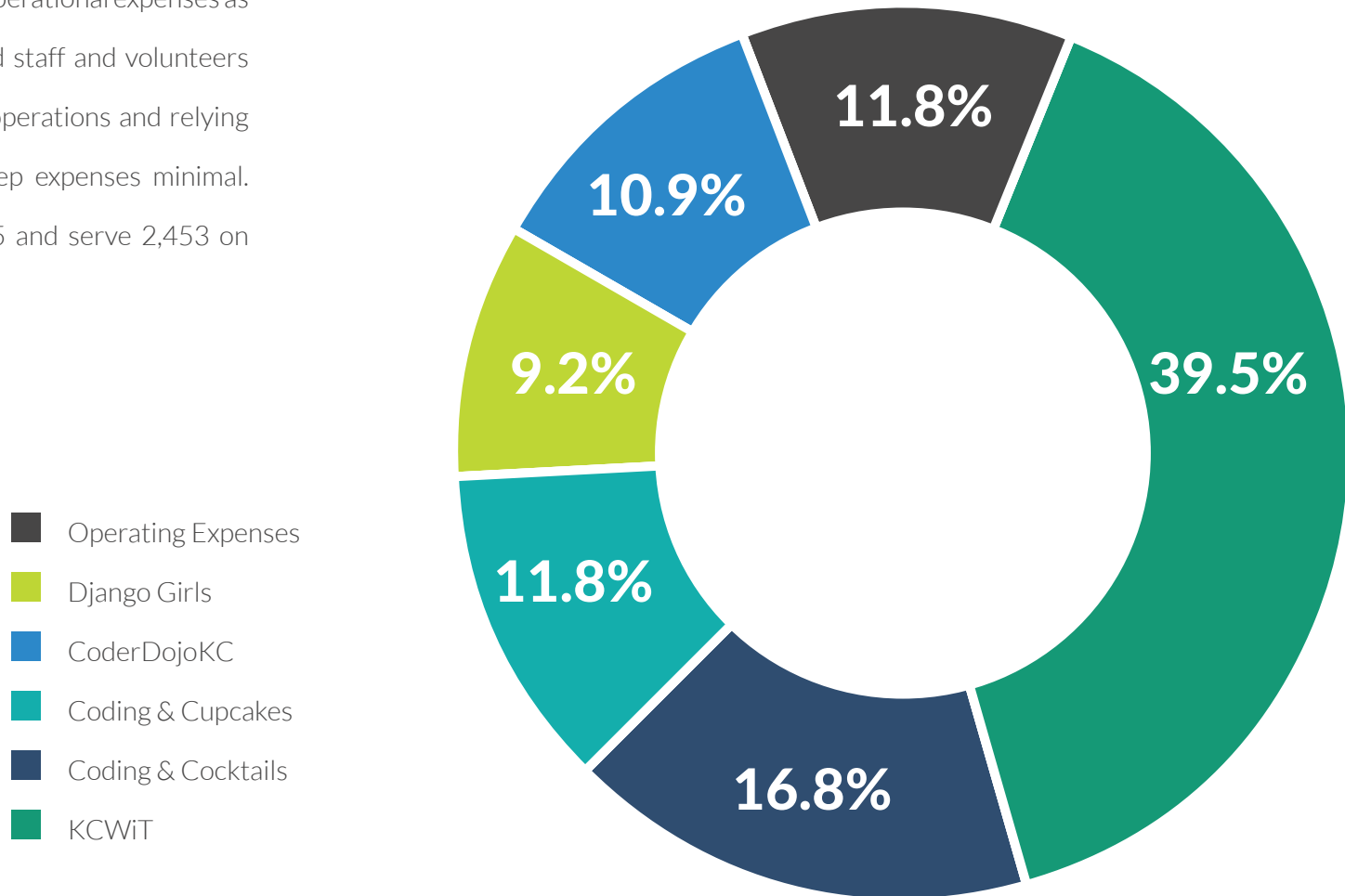

# FINANCIALS

Kansas City Women in Technology aims to provide low-cost content to the community and keeping administrative operational expenses as lean as possible. No paid staff and volunteers running the day to day operations and relying on automation tools keep expenses minimal. We were able to run 45 and serve 2,453 on \$18232.20 in 2016.
